

## Update

We are sure that many of you will have been following the news about the possibility of school re opening to more children, primarily those in the priority year groups (Nursery, Reception, Y1 and Y6) as defined by the government. Everyone is entitled to their own views about this; some parents will want their children to return to school as soon as possible, whilst others may not want it at all. Under the current pandemic, this is your choice. No sanctions will be applied if you choose not to send your child back to school should a place become available.

We are very grateful to the parents from Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 who completed the online survey sent out a few weeks ago. The survey was only sent to those particular year groups as we have been asked by the government to make them a priority. If it is safe to welcome children from other year groups in to school at a later date, we will send further surveys to gauge parent views.

The survey results and comments provided by parents helped us to understand that many parents are anxious at this time; they want their children to return to school to the normality and learning opportunities that it brings but are worried about whether their child will catch the coronavirus.

We completely understand this worry; coronavirus can be a serious disease and it is still in our local community. Whilst we can do our very best to implement social distancing principles along with following the infection control measures provided by the government, we can not guarantee that your child will not contract coronavirus from school. There is much about the disease which is still unknown and due to its apparent lack of symptoms in some cases, it would be impossible for us to confirm that it is not in school.

We will remain vigilant and follow all guidance if a suspected or confirmed case occurs. If there is a confirmed case in school, parents of children attending at that time will be informed although the name of the infected child/adult will not be given. If a confirmed case occurs and the child/adult has been in school recently, advice will be taken from Trafford infection control to ascertain if specialist cleaning is required. All of these issues will be detailed in a comprehensive risk assessment which will be completed before a wider re opening of school takes place.

It is not our intention to create uncertainty and further worries, but we feel we must be clear about the current situation and explain how school will look when we implement the new guidance, provided by the government, to cater for more pupils in school. It will not be normal school; many changes will be in place. We will not be able to confirm exact details until we know exactly how many parents want to send their children back and if/when we can open to different year groups. Some children will adapt quickly to these changes whilst others may find it difficult and upsetting.

We would all love to welcome our pupils back and make Acre Hall the lively and vibrant place we know, but that is not possible at present. Everything will be done slowly and carefully as these procedures will be new to everyone. Working within the government guidance we would only be able to have 8-10 children in each classroom. This will be known as a 'bubble' and is, in its simplest form, like a family group who isolate together in lockdown.

General principles are as follows;

- A return to school may be part time only, depending on demand for places.
- Your child may not be with their usual class teacher.
- They may not be in their usual classroom.
- Children will usually sit at desks/tables with as much distance between them as we can manage.
- Start and pick up times may be staggered.
- The children will have different playtimes/play areas to other 'bubbles' and only be able to mix with the children in their bubble.
- We can not guarantee social distancing, particularly with younger children but will encourage them to keep apart and avoid close contact with each other.
- Siblings in other year groups can not attend.
- We may not be teaching the normal curriculum as some aspects require pupils to work together and be in close contact with each other.
- Soft toys and soft furnishings will be removed from classrooms to avoid possible contamination.
- Use of toys and resources will be restricted to ensure items can be sanitised regularly.
- Drop off and pick up will be from the school gate with one parent/carer per child maintaining social distancing.
- Parents and carers will only be able to enter school in an emergency.
- If your child currently attends school and is part of our emergency childcare supervision ( for key workers and vulnerable children) it would be unlikely that he/she can swap between bubbles if/when other children at school in his/her friendship group or year group begin to attend.
- Parents must do everything they can to ensure children are not mixing socially outside of school. Children should, as far as possible, follow the same social distancing principles as adults. This will help eliminate the virus spreading should someone become infected.
- At this point we do not know if we will be able to offer any before or after school provision – this will be reviewed at a future date and will depend on possible numbers of children and the ability for them to social distance.

### **Plan**

All schools in the locality are different and are creating arrangements that they feel will work in their setting whilst applying the principles above which are from the government's guidance to schools.

We feel that there needs to be a blended approach for Acre Hall pupils. For some they will wish to come in to school – albeit a very different school to normal – and may prefer to learn 'face to face' or may be in a situation where parents are no longer able to stay at home to look after their children.

There are others, including some who have medical issues and would not be able to attend due to self- isolation or shielding a member of their household, who whilst missing interactions with their friends, would feel more secure at home and are accessing the numerous on line activities set up by staff. We have been delighted by the amount of effort given by many children to completing and

responding to learning tasks and wish to thank parents for their support in facilitating this.

We aim to trial the use of 'zoom' technology to provide regular lessons for the class ( we may have to split the class in half to make this easier but as any contact would be virtual, groups could be changed) with your child's class teacher to supplement online learning. This would also give the opportunity to spend a short time at the end of the lesson saying hello to friends. Seesaw activities would continue to be sent.

We can not provide the options outlined above to all priority year groups at once. The table on the following page shows dates and arrangements we plan to make. It must be understood that taking account of health and safety considerations, the best interests of our pupils and also depending on government restrictions/ staff availability we may have to alter these plans.

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At the beginning of July we will assess if there is space in school for more children to safely attend. As the group sizes can be no more than 10 children, due to the size of classrooms, to allow some sense of social distancing,( although it would be unrealistic to expect children to be able to keep to a strict 2M rule at all times) we will have to use more rooms and utilise most of our staff should demand for ‘in school’ places be high. We will assess if we can open to more year groups safely. The government have asked us to make Reception and Nursery pupils a priority also and we will make a decision on whether this is possible at this time.

If the Enhanced Virtual Learning works well and we have enough staff to supervise the children in school, we may be able to give the option of enhanced home learning to more year groups.

#### **A message from Mrs White**

I apologise that this guidance is lengthy and somewhat complex; it is not a simple situation. It requires careful and considered management to ensure everyone is as safe as we can make them and that our pupils can continue, as best as possible, with some form of education during this pandemic. In the 14 years that I have been teaching at Acre Hall I have learnt that Acre Hall families, more than any school I have ever worked in, care so much for their children. As parents you will know which approach will suit your child best.
